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Mina Das (Keynote Speaker) Director of NISHTHA, Bengal, India

NISHTHA was born in a very remote village of South 24 Parganas by a group of rural women who were victims of gender discrimination and had a mission of empowering the village women. Mina Das has lead the organization for over 30 years, and will share the story of NISHTHA as well as her experiences working to empower women and girls through gender equity initiatives, education and health promotion, as well as the organizations emphasis on self-sufficiency in efforts to bring clean water, safe handling and hygiene education to rural women in West Bengal.

Anastasia Shown Assistant Director

African Studies Center, University of Pennsylvania

Anastasia Shown is Assistant Director of the University of Pennsylvania's Africa Center and Lecturer at Penn's School of Social Policy and Practice and Rutgers School of Social Work. At the Center she organizes outreach programs to educate the larger public about Africa and co-manages Penn's International Development Summer Institute in Ghana. She fulfilled her B.A. at Indiana University and the University of Ghana, majoring in Women Studies and Sociology. She earned her Master of Social Work degree at the University of Pennsylvania's School of Social Policy & Practice. She conducted field work in Ghana through Penn School of Medicine's Global Health Framework and in Cameroon through the Philadelphia Global Water Initiative and Penn's Engineers Without Borders chapter. She was awarded the Global Young Advocate Award by the United Nations Association of America and a Fulbright-Hays grant to train U.S. educators in Ethiopia. Anastasia is member of the Philadelphia Global Water Initiative, Up With People Alumni Association, Global Philadelphia Association and the United Nations Association of Greater Philadelphia.

Dr. Alix Zwane Senior Program Officer Global Development Program- WASH Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation

Alix Peterson Zwane is a Senior Program Officer in the Global Development Program of the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation working on the Water, Sanitation & Hygiene Initiative. Before coming to the foundation, she was a Program Manager at google.org, the philanthropic arm of Google Inc, the Internet search firm. At google.org, she managed the health and water component of a larger initiative that works to use information to improve the quality of public services for the poor.

Caroline D'Angelo

Co-chair, editor-in-chief wH2O: The Journal of Gender & Water at the University of Pennsylvania Social Media Editor, the Pulitzer Center on Crisis Reporting

Caroline D'Angelo is the Pulitzer Center's social media editor. While at Penn, she obtained a master's degree in environmental studies, focusing on international environmental policy and communications. She won the Society of Women Environmental Professionals' graduate scholarship and the Dean's Scholar Award, in addition to several grants for international research and reporting projects in India, Sri Lanka, French Polynesia, Switzerland and France. She co-founded and serves as editor-in-chief for wH2O: The Journal of Gender & Water, the first journal on global water and women's issues. She designed the print publication, social media strategy and online presence of wH2O. She is also a Staff Writer and Managing Editor for the Initiative for Global Environmental Leadership at the Wharton School and Oikos Student Reporter.

Dr. Shannon Marquez

Associate Dean for Academic Affairs, Director of Global Public Health Initiatives, Assoc. Professor of Environ. & Occ. Health Drexel University

Dr. Márquez is an accomplished educator, researcher, administrator and "public health engineer," who has garnered local, national and international recognition for research and practice in the field of global environmental health. Her international areas of focus include safe water systems, health systems strengthening and health governance, and agricultural health. Dr. Márquez also leads research on sustainable solutions to address the environmental burden of disease and health disparities in developing countries of Africa, and has also worked in Asia, and Latin America and underserved communities in the United States. Dr. Marquez holds a PhD in environmental sciences and engineering from the UNC Gillings School of Global Public Health, a Masters in Civil Engineering from Texas A&M University, and a BS in Mechanical Engineering from Prairie View A&M University











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David Winder Chief Executive Officer WaterAid America

Dr. Winder's career has spanned the non-profit, foundation and academic spheres. He started his career in international development as a United Nations volunteer in Chile and then managed graduate programs, taught courses in public administration, social development planning and rural development policy and planning, and conducted research at the University of Manchester's Institute for Development Policy and Management in England. For over a decade he served the Ford Foundation as Regional Representative for Mexico and Central America and as Regional Representative for Southeast Asia focusing attention on developing new programs in human rights and social justice, maternal and child health and community natural resource management.

Kathleen O'Reilly Associate Professor Texas A&M University

Kathleen O'Reilly studies the social and environmental impacts of development projects, especially those working toward improvements in health through gendered drinking water, sanitation, poverty interventions. Her research is based in India, where she has worked for the past 14 years. Her earliest research focused on community and women's participation in drinking water supply management, and was followed up in 2008 with a study investigating drinking water sustainability after the project's closure. The National Science Foundation supported research across 2005-2009 that explored the effects of development projects for the NGOs fieldworkers who implement them, and resulted in a better understanding of how global-scale development policies are locally transformed and spatialized through the actions of NGO fieldworkers. An NSF CAREER Award supports her current research into the causes and solutions to India's rural sanitation crisis. It seeks insights into how village-scale and household-scale dynamics involving caste, class, and gender influence toilet usage and non-usage in rural India. Kathleen contributed to the first issue of wH2O.

Marcia Brewster Senior Consultant

Marcia Brewster brings a wealth of international experience and organizational expertise to the consulting services of Nautilus International. Formerly a senior officer for water resources at the United Nations' Department of Economic and Social Affairs, she has recently been involved in evaluations of a number of UN programs and is a strong advocate of sustainable development, particularly as it relates to water resources policy. She has organized numerous high profile events and outreach programs to educate the public and bring together fellow professionals to raise awareness, build support, and generate funding for numerous policies and projects related to natural resources and energy. Brewster has spent 13 years living and working in Asia. She has an MS in development economics from Georgetown University's School of Foreign Service. She is on the board of wH2O: The Journal of Gender & Water.

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Dennis Warner Senior Consultant Catholic Relief Services

Senior Consultant for water supply, sanitation and water resources development with Catholic Relief Services (CRS), Dennis is a humanitarian organization with projects in more than 100 countries. He has over forty years' experience in international development, working on problems of water supply, sanitation, environmental health and emergency relief assistance. He studied history and engineering at the University of Illinois, where he earned BA, BSc and MSc degrees, and at Stanford University, where he obtained a PhD in civil engineering. Dr. Warner has lived in Tanzania, Uganda, Switzerland and France and has held positions with the Peace Corps, University of Dar es Salaam, Duke University, World Health Organization, World Bank, USAID and several engineering consulting firms.

Allyn Gaestel is a freelance journalist who covers inequality and the human repercussions of politics. She is particularly interested in global health and women. Ariana Rabindranath has 15 years of global experience in research, strategic engagement, and project management on social development issues including gender inequality, sustainable development, and culture, with a focus on Asia. As a consultant for the UN Development Programme (UNDP), Ariana researched pathways to women's political participation in Asia. From 2000-2011, Ariana worked at Asia Society, most recently as Associate Director and Head of Women's Initiatives in Washington, DC, where she designed, implemented, moderated and raised funds for symposia on women's empowerment and human rights. She conducted research on violence against women in Asia and developed an extensive database of stakeholders working to empower women. Ariana earned an MA in International Affairs with a focus on Women in Development and Southeast Asia and a BA in International Studies, both from Ohio University. She is Vice President and co-Founder of The Bindi Project, an NGO with a mission to reduce violence and discrimination against girls and women in India by working with boys and men. She is a founding member of Friends of Prajwala USA, a chapter supporting the Indian anti-trafficking organization Prajwala. She served on the Board of the Malaysia-America Society from 2004-2012. Ariana has lived, worked and traveled throughout Asia and parts of Europe.

Angelita Fasnacht- Cuellar has 17 plus years of experience in Environmental & Civil Engineering, Grant Management and Engineering Management, specializing in Water and Community Health. She obtained a Masters in Public Health degree from Emory University's International Public Health program. Her professional & academic experience include managing and supporting projects for Safe Water Network, AguaAyuda, International Rural Water Association, Catholic Relief Services, Pan-American Health Organization, and WaterAid through Kosovo-Addis consulting group. Gemma Bulos is an award-winning social entrepreneur and the Director of the Global Women's Water Initiative. Prior to stepping in as Director of GWWI, Gemma was the Founder/Executive Director of A Single Drop (USA) and the Founding Director of A Single Drop for Safe Water in the Philippines, developing innovative programming that creates income- generating community-based water service organizations. For this innovation, Gemma received national and international social entrepreneur awards from Echoing Green (International, 2007), Ernst Young (Philippines 2009) and Schwab Foundation (Asia 2010), and others. Her programs also won accolades including the Tech Museum Tech Equality Award (2010) and Warriors of the UN Millennium Goals (2010), sponsored by Kodak Philippines. In 2011, she was recognized as one of the Most Influential Thought Leaders and Innovative Filipinas in the United States. Howard Neukrug Water Commissioner

Philadelphia Water Department

Howard Neukrug is chief executive of Philadelphia's water, wastewater and stormwater utilities serving over 2 million people in the Greater Philadelphia region. He is responsible for ensuring safe and affordable drinking water and providing integrated wastewater and stormwater services to support a healthy and vibrant river and stream network. In this role he oversees the management of 2000 employees, an annual operating budget of \$650 million, a \$6.2 billion capital improvement program, and an urban infrastructure system of over 6000 miles of pipes and 6 treatment facilities. Mr. Neukrug is a national leader for sustainable practices and quality management in the water industry and has served as an advisor to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, the State of Pennsylvania and the Delaware River Basin Commission. He is the creator of Philadelphia's "Clean Water, Green Cities" program which integrates land-based urban sustainability goals with the goals for clean, safe, attractive and accessible rivers and streams.
